2007 A Year in Review

*Services & Activities of the
Alberta College of Family Physicians*

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The Alberta College of Family Physicians (ACFP) is a provincial, professional voluntary organization, representing more than 2200 family physicians, family medicine residents, and medical students in Alberta. Through the voluntary contributions of so many members, the Board of Directors of the Alberta College of Family Physicians is proud to provide an overview of services, initiatives and activities successfully achieved in 2007.

Membership

As of December 2007, ACFP membership totaled 2270. Over the past five years, the membership has been increasing by an average growth of 6% annually.

Strategic Direction

The Board continues to adhere to its vision, mission and goals in the delivery of services and activities on behalf of ACFP members.

ACFP & Advocacy - 2007 Update

In 2007, the Board recognized the pressing need for the ACFP to move forward with a focused, effective and comprehensive approach on advocacy. Members recommended that an advocacy task force be established with responsibility for providing advice, consultation and oversight on the development, implementation and follow up of an effective advocacy plan.

Prior to striking a task force and working on details of the advocacy plan, the following opportunities arose:

- In response to the tentative 2-year fiscal agreement announced by AMA, AHW and RHA's, the ACFP Executive Committee released a letter in March 2007 to all members stressing how vital the allocation process would be in transforming into reality the potential benefits in the proposed financial agreement for family practice. The letter urged members to communicate their concerns to the AMA Board about family practice and the macro-allocation process. Responses received from members demonstrated their support for this new direction taken by the College.
- In April 2007, the results of the ballot count for the two-year financial agreement with Alberta physicians were announced by the AMA. With ratification of the agreement, the Executive Committee took an unprecedented step by sending a letter to the three members of the Master Committee to (a) reinforce the serious challenges facing community physicians and the precarious future of Family Medicine as a unique discipline and profession, and (b) emphasize the importance of the macro allocation process to address the issues.

Family physicians are central to health and the health care system.

Advocacy Message
August 2007*

- In May 2007, it was agreed that given the importance of advocacy, Executive Committee as a whole should take on the responsibilities of the ACFP Advocacy Task Force. From this point forward, attention focused on developing a short-term and long-term advocacy action plan.
- Attention was given to the evidence of Barbara Starfield and other renowned family medicine health policy analysts and researchers. It was clear that the evidence supported the Core Message adopted by the ACFP Advocacy Task Force: 'Family physicians are central to health and the health care system.' From this point forward, the Core Message became the fundamental underpinning of all work on the advocacy action plan which continues today.
- In December, three representatives of Executive met with the Minister of Health and Wellness Dave Hancock for the main purpose of explaining the central role that family physicians have in the health system.
- The Minister acknowledged the importance of family physicians and agreed that further meetings would be helpful.

Media Requests

Throughout the year, media (radio, television and print) requested interviews with members and/or information on a variety of topics. Administration made every effort to support these requests while respecting media deadlines. The majority of media requests were related to the issue of the shortage of family physicians in Alberta, however there were also requests for interviews on the subjects of:

- Obesity guidelines
- Patients paying for missed appointments
- Adolescent patients and family physician relationships
- Improving access to care to patients in Canada
- Physician Assistants
- Consumption of aspartame and impact on patients
- Removal of health care premiums

Alberta Family Practice Research Network

AFPRN, a program of the Alberta College of Family Physicians, provides support to:

- Family physicians interested in family medicine research, and
- Researchers who require assistance with recruitment for studies that are relevant to family practice.

AFPRN Projects - Provincial

1. AFPRN was asked to aid in the recruitment of family physicians/general practitioners to participate in a research project titled, 'Examining Barriers and Enablers for the Uptake of Best Evidence into Clinical Care: Pathways to Diagnosis and Referral for Congestive Heart Failure, Renal Failure and Diabetes Mellitus'.

The purpose of this study was to examine the factors that help or hinder applying the best available evidence in family practice.

The project was designed to look at the perceptions surrounding the complexity, roles, benefits, risks, and adherence to medical therapies for three conditions in our patients – heart failure, renal failure and diabetes.

The Clinical Director and members of the AFPRN Steering Committee reviewed this research proposal and determined that the project was valid, relevant to family practice, and would result in meaningful findings.

2. In February 2007, the results of the AFPRN 'Rewards and Challenges Study' were published in Canadian Family Physician. Initiated in 2004, this study resulted in a list of key rewards and challenges identified by family physicians, based on a disciplined, scientific approach.

AFPRN Projects - National

1. The Network was also involved in two national projects proposed by primary care research networks across Canada.

Following a workshop in April 2006, involving representatives of primary care research networks across Canada, a steering committee with commitment to the vision of a national network of networks was established. AFPRN is represented on this steering committee. In January 2007, the steering committee presented a proposal to the Canadian Institute for Health Research (CIHR) on the need for inter-agency collaboration in assessing various components of primary care models.

This presentation led to the submission of a Letter of Intent entitled "CIHR Team in Primary Care", proposed to assemble a team of primary care researchers (including existing local primary care research networks) into a national network. The national network would enable the assessment of models of primary care and comparison of patient outcomes across models. It would also assess interdisciplinary team function, including its ability to improve patient care and satisfaction. The CIHR approved the LOI and awarded the group \$10,000 to submit a full application by November 1, 2007.

2. In January 2007, the steering committee made a presentation to the Public Health Authority of Canada (PHAC) on what a National Practice Based Research Network could provide in the surveillance of chronic disease prevention and management in Canada. Following this presentation, a Research for Proposal from the PHAC was received by this group for the development of a chronic disease surveillance project.

The long term goal of this proposed project is to develop a Canadian Primary Care Sentinel Surveillance Network (CPCSSN) to collect accurate information about the most common chronic diseases (cardiovascular disease, chronic respiratory disease, chronic mental health conditions, arthritis and diabetes), their risk

factors, and determinants of disease and management at the primary care practice level. In the short term, the PHAC allocated \$10,000 for a one-day meeting of the directors of the research networks with PHAC representatives on Nov. 12, 2007.

AFPRN Poster Presentation and Research Sessions

The AFPRN Poster Presentation, held in conjunction with the 52nd ASA in February 2007, was very successful with a total of 16 abstracts displayed. Featured research topics included:

As well, two small group sessions, devoted to research were held as part of the scientific program at the ASA, including:

- ***Clinical Detectives/Staying Up to Date*** This workshop examined 10 common family practice problem cases and the most current evidence to solve the mystery.
- ***What's Up Doc? Sharing Ideas*** This workshop presented works in progress of participatory research.

AFPRN Redesign Task Force

In 2006, the Board struck an independent task force to (a) examine the mandate of AFPRN including infrastructure resources, and (b)


assess the roles and structures associated with planning and operating the Network. There was consensus among Task Force members that AFPRN in its current form is not sustainable for a number of reasons: insufficient funds, too broad a mandate, and lack of support for community family physicians to learn and hone research skills. Based on this finding, the outcome of deliberations, and a review of the literature and consultations, the Task Force made several recommendations.

The Board accepted the recommendations of the AFPRN Review Task Force and agreed that a second phase be implemented called the AFPRN Redesign. This AFPRN Redesign Task Force, established in September 2007, is mandated to:

- design a provincial family practice research network based on the key elements developed in the first phase, and
- describe the features of a newly designed family practice research network.

At its recent meetings, the AFPRN Redesign Task Force agreed that (a) while there is an increased emphasis and growth of primary care research involving several health disciplines, it is critical to continually advance the academic discipline of Family Medicine by conducting, promoting and supporting family practice research; and (b) there is a need for a provincial group, rooted in the community, to undertake this role. Currently, the AFPRN Redesign Task Force is discussing this provincial group with respect to its governance and administrative structures, funding sources, strategic alliances, potential opportunities, etc.

Medical Students



Virtual Poster Project

The Virtual Poster project is part of the ACFP's overall strategy aimed at raising awareness among medical students on the benefits and diversity of family practice. In collaboration with the Alberta Medical Association's sections of General Practice and Rural Medicine, the ACFP developed a third series of posters, centering on questions asked by medical students at previous events. This series is titled: **'you asked...'**

Over the 2006-07 academic year, medical students at both the University of Alberta and the University of Calgary, receive one poster (at regular intervals) via email. Unique to this series of posters is an audio component, designed so that the students (if they choose) could see a new dimension to the virtual poster project, and the messaging could be enhanced.

The 2007 Virtual Poster series of You Asked... include:

- Why is Family Practice so unique?
- What can I expect to earn as a Family Physician?
- As a Family Physician, are there opportunities for Teaching?
- As a Family Physician, are there opportunities for Research?
- What about Continuing Medical Education (CME)?
- What can you tell me about PCN's in Alberta?
- What about workplace opportunities for Family Practice?
- Why should I choose a career in Family Medicine?

ACFP Presence at Medical Student Events

The ACFP participated in orientation sessions and meetings, and provided on-going communication with medical students, including:

- University of Calgary Medical Student Orientation – Aug/07
- University of Alberta Medical Student Orientation - Aug/07
- RPAP Recruitment Fair (Edmonton) – Sept/07
- Verbal and written communication with UofA and UofC FMIG's representatives and the medical student representatives on the ACFP Board.
- University of Alberta lunch hour small group information session open to all medical students, supported by the ACFP.

Shadowing Project for Incoming Medical Students

This project, also a collaborative effort with the AMA Sections of Rural Medicine and General Practice, provided shadowing opportunities for 17 students from the University of Alberta and the University of Calgary in the summer of 2007. Ten students had rural placements and the remaining seven had urban placements. Placements for the U of C incoming medical students occurred during the week of July 23 - 27, 2007. U of A students were placed during the week of August 20-24, 2007

Each physician contacted was delighted to be asked and enthusiastic about demonstrating pride in their profession. Participating family physicians practised in a variety of settings, for example, inner city, women's health, emergency, large and small practice offices, and some with hospital privileges. Guidelines for the Shadowing Program for Incoming Medical Students were distributed to all participants prior to the beginning of the placement.

Overall, the project proved to be very successful in providing the students with a positive and 'eye-opening' introduction into the world of family practice in Alberta. The physicians expressed enthusiasm and pride in sharing a small part of their professional lives with new students about to begin their careers in medical education.

Sample student responses

- *My experience surpassed my expectations. Dr. X let me observe all the patients she saw and I saw a wide range of patients. She answered all my questions and provided lots of additional information. I felt I learned a lot about the field of family medicine as well as the practice of it.*

- *I was considering it before, and this experience has only made me want to be a family physician more! The breadths of knowledge and patient-physician relationships are incredibly appealing to me.*
- *Yes, Dr. X showed me that there is a wide range of options available in the field of family medicine for working with a wide variety of patients and environments.*
- *Thank you for the great introduction to medicine.*

Sample Physician Responses

- *It's a great way to influence the 'would-be' medical student toward family medicine!*
- *This was very interesting because I could get an idea what the "raw product" is before the formal education starts. The exposure with the incoming students now gives a better perspective about how they develop as physicians.*
- *I think the program is well designed and might change a few students perception of family practice.*
- *I had a wonderful week with Student X. He showed up every morning on time and displayed a lot of interest.*
- *Overall I found it to be a fun experience. Of course, the time spent discussing the cases did slightly slow me down compared to my usual office pace, but as this occurred during the summer months, our office volume was less than normal, and so I did not really find this to be a detriment.*

Continuing Medical Education

Review & Accreditation of Mainpro®-M1 Courses

Dr. Dorcas Kennedy continued as the provincial Accreditor of Mainpro-1 applications to ensure that high standards were met and regional interests and perspectives were considered.

The Alberta College of Family Physicians processed a total of 129 Mainpro-M1 applications, a decrease of approximately 25% compared to the number of applications processed in 2006. This reduction of applications correlates with an overall decrease in new program development by CME Providers.

Annual Scientific Assembly (ASA)



52nd ASA – February 2007

Attendance for the 52nd ASA reached an all-time record of 282. This count includes all family physicians and medical students in attendance.

For the first time, the capacity to accept on-line registrations and payments was achieved. Registrants easily accessed the conference registration form via the ACFP website, and fewer than 10% of all registrants mailed in cheques and/or registered by phone.

In preparation for the 53rd ASA in February 2008, the 53rd ASA Planning Committee engaged in many ongoing activities throughout 2007. The following is an overview of the planning and organizing that took place in 2007:

- The planning committee met to review evaluations from the 52nd ASA, discuss the format and topics for scientific

sessions, identify required changes, recommend improvements and suggest potential speakers for the 2008 conference.

- Speakers, sponsors and exhibitors were confirmed.
- ACFP contracted and worked with Casey MacDonald to develop and implement an in-house online registration and payment process.
- ACFP developed a fresh, new visual identity for the ASA. The new look was incorporated into marketing materials used to promote the 53rd ASA. These materials included a teaser postcard, a full length brochure, a mini conference schedule, list serve messages, website updates, etc.
- Communication is ongoing with the ASA Planning Committee including teleconferences and weekly updates.

Alberta College of Family Physicians Awards

The Alberta College of Family Physicians (ACFP) values the achievements and professional commitment of its members and is committed to supporting its membership in providing quality patient care through education, research and promotion of best practices.

The Colleges *Continuing Professional Achievement Recognition of Excellence (CARE)* awards were introduced in 2004 to celebrate the achievements and dedication of ACFP members. Recognition of Excellence Awards

This award will recognize ACFP members who in the past 12-24 months have made an outstanding contribution in a specific area pertaining to one or more of the following areas: Patient Care, Community Service, Hospital or Health Care Institutions, College Activities (National or Chapter), Teaching, Research, and other elements of the academic discipline of Family Medicine.

Examples of outstanding contributions may include, but are not limited to the following:

- Significant humanitarian work on a global basis
- Establishment of a training program in an area such as family violence
- Delivery of an educational program unique to the needs of a population at risk
- Excellence in clinical practice to disadvantaged communities, such as inner cities
- Leadership in primary care renewal projects, hospital, regional health care programs etc.
- Development of an innovative research project or program that contributes to the improvement of day-to-day clinical practice

The first Recognition of Excellence award recipients will be honoured at the 53rd ASA in Banff, AB (Feb. 2008).


